OPENING

I am pleased to provide you with my 1st ever fixed pricelist (FPL) sale with highlights from none other than the long-time collector of counterfeit Capped Bust half dollars (CBH), Larry Schmidt. Larry assembled his advanced collection of more than 100 die struck counterfeit CBH varieties over several decades. For this collection subject matter, this is a level of completion and achievement that fewer than 10 numismatists (per my estimate) have ever ascended to, notably due to how rare or scarce many of these varieties are. For many years, Larry managed the website <http://cccbhcc.com/>, growing the content and uniting collectors with this shared interest following Keith Davignon's second edition of *Contemporary Counterfeit Capped Bust Half Dollars* in 2010. Many of Larry's pieces have been off the market for decades offering a rare opportunity to acquire some seldom available pieces. Included in this FPL are 98 lots including about 80 of Larry's CBH varieties (with some duplicates), other type, and 3 counterfeit coin detector devices.

To my knowledge, Larry's collection and selection of counterfeit CBHs in this sale constitutes the largest single offering of its kind to come to market in approximately a decade. Other comparably large and diverse collections have sold over this time period, such as from Harvey Bastacky, but Larry's offering here edges those out. As such, it must be mentioned that these sale opportunities are few and far between, and may only come to market every 5 to 10 years.

I had the privilege of studying these pieces for more than a month in order to adequately study, document, photograph, describe, and catalog these pieces to the maximum level of detail I could provide. The pieces offered here provided us with new information about this subject that have never been documented before, including new planchet alloy groups for a given obverse-reverse (O-R) die marriage (DM), the first time a lettered edge die marriage could be attributed to O-R DMs, newly attributed lettered edge DMs, and the first time a reeded edge was documented for an O-R DM that should not have a reeded edge! This illustrates that there is much more to learn about these counterfeit coins—and I anticipated this type of new information being documented for years after my *Bad Metal* publication.

This sale opens new opportunities for the current collector base to add and cherish these rare and scarce varieties to their collections, upgrade varieties, and even add unusual pieces to their collections, such as some double struck examples!

All pieces are offered on a first-come basis (see contact method below), and if you see something you really would like to add to your collection, getting in touch sooner gives you a better chance at owning it. **Please provide lot number, price, and preferred payment method.** Pieces will be placed on hold pending receipt of payment. I will regularly update this FPL with all Hold, Pending or Sold listings.

1. 1817. Davignon 3-C.

1 of 3 examples documented.

Copper planchet (the other 2 examples documented were struck on German silver planchets).

Edge lettering is not visible.

Overall condition is rough with dark, porous surfaces.

But the main details are visible and bold, including the

misspelling of UNITED as UITED.

There are only 2 die struck counterfeit CBH varieties dated 1817 with a total known population of 4 between them. If you are missing this date and variety now may be your last chance to acquire this for quite some time.

Brass planchet (this is likely the more accurate alloy instead of ‘copper’ as reported in the *Bad Metal* book).

Overall, this piece has good details. The only major issue is the obvious reverse puncture resulting in a small hole.

Strong devices despite some wear. No major marks other than a light curved indent at the next of Liberty. Micro-porosity which is not unusual for this variety.

Well-worn example with mostly clean surfaces other than some super thin scratches and a small divot by the denomination.

Nearly perfect surfaces, with the repunched details bold. This is a really nice example.

REEDDED EDGE! The first documented example from this variety and family with this edge type!

This example is evenly worn with about half the details boldly visible. This piece may have been struck with not perfectly square dies due to opposing strike weakness on each side. A few small test scratches are present on both sides.

Billon planchet. The *Bad Metal* book only states a copper planchet and this example may have a copper core with a lot of silver plating remaining thus a higher silver XRF result.

This is a nice example of this moderately scarce variety. Excellent surfaces with just a few small tiny test scratch blemishes.

more worn or damaged. This is a high-grade example with nearly perfect surfaces for being 200 year old copper. While most of the uglier examples sell for \$25-50, the scarcity of nicer examples commands stronger prices. Many years ago this variety was thought of as a rare pattern.

This example has very nice details and a nearly perfect planchet with the exception of some minor obverse pitting in front of Liberty. There are only 2 varieties dated 1824 and this variety seems to be slightly more attainable than 1824 2-B.

JOHN ALLENDER



96. John Allender 5-Coin Counterfeit Gold Detector

John Allender developed two mechanical, rocker-style counterfeit detectors in the first-half of the 1850s. The first model and design (circa 1851-53), and shown here, had spots for 5 denominations of gold coins, \$20, \$10, \$5, \$2.50, \$1. These were manufactured by I. Wilson of New London, Connecticut. Most examples are found with 'J. Allender / Patent Pending' but some are stamped 'U.S. Gold Balance'.

This counterfeit detector is identified as *Newman Mallis IV-1-6* in the publication titled *U.S. Coin Scales and Counterfeit Coin Detectors* (1999).

Overall condition is very good with presumably its original patina.

97. John Allender 6-Coin Counterfeit Gold Detector

In 1854 and 1855, John Allender redesigned his original mechanical, rocker-style counterfeit detector to add a \$3 gold piece spot. This design is known with both 'PATENT PENDING' and, as shown here, 'Patent Nov. 27, 1855' (patent # 13,840) stamped on the right side. Other minor variations exist.

This counterfeit detector is identified as *Newman Mallis II-2-9* in the publication titled *U.S. Coin Scales and Counterfeit Coin Detectors* (1999).

HARVEY MARANVILLE



98. Harvey Maranville Counterfeit Coin Detector.

In 1857, Harvey Maranville of Clinton Ohio designed and patented (patent # 16,390 on January 13, 1857) this rocker-style counterfeit detector from brass. These were manufactured by C. E. Staples of Worcester, Massachusetts. This detector was designed to authenticate both U.S. silver and gold coins along with a selection of foreign silver and gold coins. Maranville later designed 2 other detectors in 1860 and 1878.

This counterfeit detector is identified as *Newman-Mallis IV-4-1* in the publication titled *U.S. Coin Scales and Counterfeit Coin Detectors* (1999).

Overall condition is very good and appears to have its original patina. The right sliding arm is presumably lighter in color as it was more protected from handling than the more exposed parts. The bottom stand is slightly bent but this can be straightened with minor effort and does not affect the functionality of this device.
